These two convertibles (1962 and 1965) have been sitting in a shed at her uncle's house, mere feet away from where we've visited her family for years. No one thought to mention them to me before. Caitlin and other family members began to reminisce of Mick carrying Grand Marshals or Dairy Princesses in his Lincolns in local town pa-

John Denver American Entertainer 1943 - 1997

Henry John Deutschendorf Jr. was born on December 31. 1943, ín Roswell, New Mexico, to Captain Henry John "Dutch" Deutschendorf Sr., a United States Army Air Forces pilot stationed at Roswell Army Air Field, and his wife, Erma Louíse.

In his 1994 autobiography, *Take Me Home*, Denver described his life as the eldest son of a family shaped by a stern father who could not show his love for his children. Because Denver's father was in the military and his family moved often, it was difficult for him to make friends and fit in with other children of his own age. Constantly being the new kid was troubling for the introverted Denver, and he grew up always feeling as though he should be somewhere else, but never knowing where that 'right' place was. (Continued from page 2) Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, Arízona, Denver was a member of the Tucson Arízona Boys Chorus for two years. He was content in Tucson, but hís father was then transferred to Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Alabama, where Denver díslíked the racísm of hís segregated school. The family later moved to Carswell Aír Force Base in Fort Worth, Texas, where Denver graduated from Arlington Heights High School. Fort Worth was a distressing experience for Denver, and in his third year of high school, he drove hís father's car to California to visit family friends and begin his music career. His father flew to California in a friend's jet to retrieve him, and Den*ver reluctantly returned to* complete hís schooling.

Early career - At age 11, Denver received an acoustic guitar from his grandmother. He learned to play well enough to perform at local clubs by the time he was in college. He decided to change his name when Randy Sparks, founder of the New Christy Minstrels, suggested that 'Deutschendorf' would not fit comfortably on a marquee. Denver attended Texas Tech University in Lubbock and sang in a folk music group, "The Alpine Trio", while studying architecture. He was also a member of the Delta Tau Delta fraterníty. Denver dropped out of Texas Tech in 1963 and moved to Los Angeles, where he sang in folk clubs. In 1965, he joined The Chad (Continued on page 5)

rades. After putting my own eyes on these cars for the first time, I fantasized about getting them cleaned up and driving around town whenever we visited my inlaws. These are both beautiful cars in great original condition.

I grew up in a "Chevy family" that always included a 1955 Bel Air in some project state, and watched my dad work on cars and rebuild engines. When I asked him to come to help me get this Lincoln running, he was excited at the challenge. After the first few hours of tinkering, we could tell this car hadn't run in quite a while and was going to take more work to get running and roadworthy than we anticipated. I left deflated but determined. My wife ended up purchasing the 1962 from her uncle James McNellis,

making us the third-generation owners, and her dad arranged to borrow a flatbed tow truck and bring it to Blaine, Minnesota, where I could spend more time on it.

Project "Penny" begins in August 2018. I pulled the gas tank out and had it cleaned and relined. I pulled the old fuel lines and installed new stainless steel lines. My dad rebuilt the carburetor. I pulled the radiator and had it re-cored, and installed new hoses. Fast forward to spring of 2019 because I don't have a heated place to work through the winter, and crunch time was on with the goal of driving this Lincoln to the MSRA Back-to-the-50s car show at the Minnesota State Fairgrounds in June. It became an "all hands on deck" family affair, with even our mothers helping by cleaning parts and polishing hubcaps. By April, the engine was running briefly before it wasn't again. This was when we learned about the nylon teeth timing gear. After figuring out that head-

(Continued from page 3) Mitchell Trio, replacing founder Chad Mitchell. After more personnel changes, the trio later became known as "Denver, Boise, and Johnson" (John Denver, David Boise, and Michael Johnson).

In 1969, Denver abandoned band life to pursue a solo career and released his first album for RCA Records. Rhymes & *Reasons*. Two years earlíer, he had made a self-produced demo recording of some of the songs he played at hís concerts. It included a song he had written called "Babe, I Hate to Go", later renamed "Leaving on a Jet Plane". Denver made several copies and gave them out as presents for Christmas. Producer Mílt Okun, who produced records for The Chad Mitchell Trío and the highprofile folk group Peter, Paul and Mary, had become Denver's producer as well. Okun brought the unreleased "Jet Plane" song to Peter, Paul and Mary. Their version of the song hit number one on the Billboard Hot 100. Denver's song also made it to No. 2 in the UK in February 1970, having also made No. 1 on the US Cash Box chart ín December 1969.

RCA did not actively promote *Rhymes & Rea*sons with a tour, but Denver embarked on an impromptu supporting tour throughout the Midwest, stopping at towns (Continued on page 6)

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(Continued from page 5) and cities, offering to play free concerts at local venues. When he was successful in persuading a school, college, Amerícan Legion hall, or coffeehouse to let him play, he distributed posters in the town and usually showed up at the local radio statíon, guítar ín hand, offering himself for an interview. With his foot in the door as writer of "Leaving on a Jet Plane", he was often successful in gaining some promotional airtime, usually featuring one or two songs performed live. Some venues let hím play for the 'door'; others restricted him to selling copies of the album at intermissíon and after the show.

After several months of this constant low-key touring schedule, he had also buílt a sízable and solid fan base, many of whom remained loyal throughout hís career. Denver recorded two more albums ín 1970. Take Me to Tomorrow and Whose Garden Was This, including a mix of songs he had written and cover versions of other artísts' composítíons.

Career peak - Denver's next album, Poems, Prayers & Promises (1971), was a breakthrough for him in the United States, thanks in part to the single "Take Me Home, Country Roads", which went to No. 2 on the Billboard charts despite the first pressings of the track

scratcher, changing the timing gear and chain, and multiple broken or bent pushrods, this old original MEL 430 finally purred. Now on to the brakes, which were rusted and beyond salvaging. I installed new stainless steel brake lines and new shocks. At this point, the decision was made to modernize and convert to four-wheel disc brakes. After a few hiccups with the imperfect and incomplete conversion kit and installing the freshly painted wheels and whitewall tires, it was finally ready for the inaugural drive on June 15, 2019... only six days before Back-to-the-50s. Mission Accomplished.

The next goal was to get the convertible top operational again, but I was going to enjoy putting some miles on the car before tackling this project. We set the next goal of Back-tothe-50s 2020 to get that done. I ended up buying the full kit, including the pump, four hydraulic cylinders, and all new hydraulic lines. After getting the parts installed in the spring of 2020, the monumental task of bleeding the system began. After cleaning the electrical contacts, all the relays and limit switches worked. The jackscrew locking mechanisms were previously removed but found in the shed where the Lincoln was stored. A week before the COVID canceled Back-to-the-50s 2020, the convertible top was moving up and down flawlessly again.

We are now on to our third full summer of top-down cruising and couldn't be happier. Caitlin's cousin purchased the other 1965 Lincoln convertible from his uncle, and it is now cruising in Sioux Falls. We hope to reunite these two convertibles sometime next summer.

Collectible Classic

A Collectible Classic; the 1961- 1963 Lincoln Continental. This article appeared in the November 2012 issue of Automobile magazine. It is an interesting story that deserves reprinting here.



No mistaking what this car is.

When critics carp that the Lincoln brand needs to "recapture its lost glory," the suicidedoor Continental is what they have in mind. Modern yet elegant, its simple, unsculpted "blade-side" sheetmetal and overall symmetry instantly made its competitors, still clinging to fins and other styling excesses of the 1950s, look stale and irrelevant. The Continental was also the antithesis of its immediate predecessor, the frightful-looking 1958-60 Continentals (Marks III, IV, and V). The new Lincoln was perfectly in tune with Kennedy-era optimism and renewal; the beginnings of the sexual revolution; and the pillbox hats, slimmed-down suits, and other cultural signposts of the early 1960s now celebrated by the TV show Mad Men.



The Continental originally was penned as a two-door Thunderbird concept, but when future Ford president Robert S. McNamara (Continued on page 7)

(Continued from page 6) being distorted. Its success was due in part to the efforts of his new manager, future Hollywood producer Jerry Weintraub, who signed Denver in 1970. Weintraub insisted on a reissue of the track and began a radio airplay campaign that started in Denver, Colorado. Denver's career flouríshed thereafter, and he had a series of hits over the next four years. In 1972, he scored his first Top Ten album with Rocky Mountain High, with its title track reaching the Top Ten in 1973. In 1974 and 1975, Denver experienced an impressive chart dominance, with a string of four No. 1 songs ("Sunshine on My Shoulders", "Annie's Song", "Thank God I'm a Country Boy", and "I'm Sorry") and three No. 1 albums (John Denver's Greatest Híts, Back Home Agaín, and Windsong).

In the 1970s, Denver's onstage appearance included long blond hair and wire -rimmed "granny" glasses. His embroidered shirts emblazoned with images commonly associated with the American West were created by the designer and appliqué artist Anna Zapp.

After appearing as a guest on many shows, Denver hosted his own variety and music specials, including several concerts from Red Rocks Amphitheatre. His seasonal special, Rocky Mountain Christmas, was watched by more than 60 million people and was the highest-rated show for the ABC network at that time. Denver was also a guest

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saw it in a design studio, he decided that it would better serve as a car to resurrect Lincoln, which was then, as now, a struggling brand. A design team supervised by Elwood Engel, who later served as Chrysler's design chief, churned out the four-door Continental in only two weeks, and it soon went into production as both a sedan and a convertible. Reviewers grasped for superlatives. Tom McCahill of Mechanix Illustrated wrote that the 1961 Continental was "one of the plushest wolftraps on the road. It's as quiet as the love life of a bass, and it rides as smooth as spilt fudge on a canted stove. [Its] looks will equal any car's in the nation and, in the opinion of some of my arty friends, will trim all others six ways from the post and twice on Sunday." Indeed. The editors of Car Life, less prone to hyperbole, declared simply and accurately that the Continental was "the best-looking American car built today."



The Continental was also one of the bestbuilt American cars of its time, the recipient of a rigorous quality-assurance program that began with the 1956 Mark II coupe. The Continental, like the Mark III sedan, had unibody construction but was said to be 67 percent stiffer, thanks partly to the rear-hinged back doors, which allowed for stronger B-pillars.

Each of its 300-hp, 430-cubic-inch V-8 engines was dyno-tested for three hours, disassembled for visual inspection, and rebuilt, and the three-speed automatic transmission was tested for thirty minutes before installation. Completed vehicles were subjected to a twelve-mile road test, and no break-in period or 1000-mile service was required; cars were not expected back in the dealership service bay until the first oil change at 6000 miles. To reinforce the company's level of confidence in the new Continental's mechanical fortitude, Lincoln added a two-year/24,000-mile warranty, which was virtually unheard of in the early 1960s. The Continental became not just a highwater mark in Lincoln's styling history -equaled only by the stunning Mark III coupe of 1968 -- it for the first time put Lincoln on equal footing with Cadillac. Brian Ventura, owner of the velvet turquoise metallic over turquoise convertible that we drove, also owns the matching sedan pictured here. If two turquoise 1962 Continentals seems excessive, consider that Ventura, an oboist for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, has a 525pipe organ in the family room of his suburban colonial.

Ventura's Continental twins are sitting in his driveway, and the convertible's top is down. The cars look relatively large, but in fact the Continental was petite in its time. Compared with the 1960 Lincoln, its wheelbase was eight inches shorter; its overall length, at 17.7 feet, was down some fifteen inches; and it was about three inches shorter in height. (By 1964, the Continental had a three-inch-longer wheelbase and a larger trunk. By 1969 -- the final year for what's considered the fourth-generation Continental -- it was a foot longer than in '61, the droptop had left the lineup and a coupe had appeared, and the overall form had become slightly less beautiful.) Nevertheless, as you slide over the amply padded bench seat and take in the walnut trim, the twin-hooded dashboard, and the wonderfully slim steering wheel, nothing about this car reads "small." The flat hood stretches for yards in front of you, and even the horizontal brake pedal and the slanted, vertical gas pedal, both ringed in chrome, seem oversize to modern eyes.

Lower the seat electrically, fasten the lap belt, and turn the key. A muted V-8 thrum filters into the cabin, but the point of the Continental was not to hear the engine -- it *(Continued on page 8)*

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star on *The Muppet Show*, the beginning of the lifelong friendship between Denver and Jim Henson that spawned two television specials with the Muppets, A Christmas Together and Rocky Mountaín Holíday. He also tried acting, appearing in "The Colorado Cattle Caper" episode of the McCloud television movie in February 1974. He starred in the 1977 film *Oh*, God! opposite George Burns. Denver hosted the Grammy Awards five times in the 1970s and 1980s, and guesthosted *The Tonight Show* on multíple occasíons. In 1975, he was awarded the Country Music Association's Entertainer of the Year award.

Political activism - In the míd-1970s, Denver became outspoken in politics. He expressed his ecologic interests in the epic 1975 song "Calypso", an ode to the eponymous exploration ship RV *Calypso* used by Jacques Cousteau. In 1976, he campaigned for Carter, who became a close friend and ally. Denver was a supporter of the Democratic Party and of a number of charitable causes for the envíronmental movement, the homeless, the poor, the hungry, and the African AIDS crísís.

Later years and humanitarian work - Denver had a few more US Top 30 hits as the 1970s ended, but nothing to match his earlier success. He began to focus more on humanitarian and sustainability causes, focusing extensively on nature conservation projects. (Continued on page 9)

was to make its driver and passengers feel pampered and fabulous. This the Lincoln does exceptionally well. As we drive along boulevards, through a park, and onto the freeway, the Continental displays the cushy ride comfort that reviewers raved about half a century ago. The automatic transmission is as smooth as one could expect, the Conti cruises at 70 to 75 mph with nonchalance, and the drum brakes -- fortified by Ventura with dual master cylinders -- are surprisingly effective. The steering has plenty of play but ultimately is precise, and the gas pedal is stiff but moves linearly.

The Continental made Lincoln relevant and cast a halo of desirability over the brand that lasted for years. The new MKZ shows great promise, but it's not a flagship. What we need from Lincoln is a large, rear-wheeldrive sedan with the panache, poise, and impact of the 1961 Continental. We need a Lincoln that our children will want to collect in 2061.

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He made public expression of his acquaintances and friendships with ecological design researchers such as Richard Buckminster Fuller (about whom he wrote and composed "What One Man Can Do") and Amory Lovins, from whom he said he learned much.

From 1973 to at least 1979, Denver annually performed at the yearly fundraising picnic for the Aspen Camp School for the Deaf, raising half of the camp's annual operating budget. During the Aspen Valley Hospital's \$1.7 million capital campaign in 1979, Denver was the largest single donor.

In 1983 and 1984, Denver hosted the annual Grammy Awards. In the 1983 fínale, Denver was joined on stage by folk music legend Joan Baez, with whom he led an all-star ver síon of "Blowín' ín the Wind" and "Let the Sunshine In", joined by such diverse musical icons as Jennífer Warnes, Donna Summer, and Ríck James. Due to his love of flying, he was attracted to NASA and became dedicated to America's work in outer space. He conscientiously worked to help bring into being the "Citizens in Space" program. In 1985 Denver received the NASA Exceptional Public Service Medal for "helping to increase awareness of space exploration by the peoples of the world", an award usually restricted to spaceflight engineers and designers.

In 1997, Denver filmed an episode for the television (Continued on page 10)

His last song, "Yellowstone, Coming Home", composed while rafting along the Colorado River with his son and young daughter, is included. His final concert was held in Corpus Christi, Texas, at the Selena Auditorium on October 5.

Personal Life - Denver's first marriage was to Anníe Martell of St. Peter, Mínnesota. She was the subject of his song "Annie's Song", which he composed in only ten minutes as he sat on a Colorado skí líft. They lived in Edina, Minnesota, from 1968 to 1971. After the success of "Rocky Mountaín Hígh", inspíred by a camping trip with Annie and some friends, Denver bought a residence in Aspen, Colorado. He lived in Aspen continuously until hís death. The Denvers adopted a boy, Zachary John, and a girl, Anna Kate, who, Denver saíd, were "meant to be" theirs. Denver once saíd, "I'll tell you the best thing about me. I'm some guy's dad; I'm some little gal's dad. When I die, Zachary John and Anna Kate's father, boy, that's enough for me to be remembered by. That's more than enough". Denver and Martell divorced in 1982. In a 1983 interview shown in the documentary *John Denver*: Country Boy (2013), Denver saíd that career demands drove them apart; Martell saíd they were too young and immature to deal with Denver's sudden success. (Continued from page 10) Denver married Australian actress Cassandra Delaney ín 1988 after a two -year courtship. Settling at Denver's home in Aspen, the couple had a daughter, Jesse Belle. Denver and Delaney separated in 1991 and divorced in 1993. Of his second marríage, Denver said that "before our shortlived marriage ended in dívorce, she managed to make a fool of me from one end of the valley to the other".

Beyond music, Denver's artistic interests included painting, but because of his limiting schedule he pursued photography, saying once, "photography is a way to communicate a feeling".

Denver was also an avid skier and golfer, but his principal interest was in flying. His love of flying was second only to his love of music. In 1974, he bought a Learjet to fly himself to concerts. He was a collector of vintage biplanes and owned a Christen Eagle aerobatic plane, two Cessna 210 Centurion airplanes, and in 1997 an amateur-built Rutan Long-EZ.

Death - Denver died on the afternoon of October 12, 1997, when his light homebuilt aircraft, a Rutan Long-EZ crashed into Monterey Bay near Pacific Grove, California, while making a series of touchand-go landings at the nearby Monterey Peninsula Airport. He was the plane's only occupant.

Denver was a pílot with over 2,700 hours of experience. He had pilot (Continued on page 12)

(Continued from page 11) ratings for single-engine land and sea, multi-engine land, glider and instrument. He also held a type rating in his Learjet. He had recently purchased the Long-EZ aircraft, made by

someone else from a kit, and had taken a half-hour checkout flight with the aircraft the day before his accident.

Post-accident investigation by the National Transportatíon Safety Board showed that the leading cause of the accident was Denver's inability to switch fuel tanks during flight. The quantíty of fuel had been depleted during the plane's flight to Monterey and in several brief practice takeoffs and landings Denver performed at the airport immediately before the final flight. He turned down an offer to refuel, saying that he would be flying for about an hour.

Legacy - Upon the announcement of Denver's death. Colorado Governor Roy Romer ordered all state flags to be lowered to half-staff in his honor. Funeral services were held at Faith Presbyterian Church in Aurora, Colorado, on October 17, 1997, officíated by Pastor Les Felker, a retired Air Force chaplain, after which Denver's remaíns were cremated and his ashes scattered in the Rocky Mountains. Further tributes were made at the following Grammy and Country Music Associatíon Awards.

In 1998, Denver posthumously received the Lifetime Achievement Award (Continued on page 13)

On March 12, 2007, the Colorado Senate passed a resolution to make Denver's trademark 1972 hít "Rocky Mountain High" one of the state's two official state songs, sharing duties with its predecessor, "Where the Columbines Grow". The resolution passed 50-11 in the House, defeating an objection by Representative Debbie Stafford that the song reflected drug use, most specifically in the line "friends around the campfire and everybody's high". Senator Bob Hagedorn, who sponsored the proposal, defended the song as having nothing to do with drugs, but rather everything to do with sharing with friends the euphoría of experiencing the beauty of Colorado's mountaín vístas. Senator Nancy Todd said, "John Denver to me is an icon of what Colorado ís."

On April 21, 2011, Denver became the first inductee into the Colorado Music Hall of Fame. A benefit concert was held at Broomfield's 1stBank Center and hosted by Olivia Newton-John. Other performers participating in the event included the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Lee Ann Womack, and John Oates. Both his ex-wives attended, and the award was presented to his three children.

On March 7, 2014, the West Virginia Legislature approved a resolution to make "Take Me Home, Country Roads" the official (Continued on page 14)

Denver is only the second person, along with Stephen Foster, to have written two state songs. On October 24, 2014, Denver was awarded a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in Hollywood, California.

Related Artists - Bill Danoff and Taffy Nivert, billed as Fat City and credited as co-writers of Denver's song "Take Me Home, Country Roads", were close friends of Denver and his family, appearing as singers and songwriters on many of Denver's albums until they formed the Starland Vocal Band in 1976. Denver's solo recording contract resulted in part from the recording by Peter, Paul, and Mary of his song "Leavíng on a Jet Plane", which became the sole number-one hit single for the group. Denver recorded songs by Tom Paxton, Eríc Andersen, John Prine, David Mallett, and many others in the folk scene. Hís record company, Windstar, is still an active record label today. Olívía Newton-John, an Australían singer whose across-theboard appeal to pop, middle -of-the-road, and country audiences in the mid-1970s was símílar to Denver's, lent her distinctive backup vocals to Denver's 1975 síngle "Fly Away"; she performed the song with Denver on hís 1975 *Rocky* Mountaín Chrístmas specíal.

Seattle's Space Needle, Pacific Science Center, Monorail, Seattle Center, many other buildings were built for the 1962 World Fair.

Pop Culture History - Episode 122 of *The Twilight Zone, An Occurrence at Owl Creek Bridge*, was a French film short that had won awards at the Cannes Film Festival in 1962 and an Oscar for Live Action Short Film in 1963. Producers paid \$25,000 for rights that limited them to airing the story no more than two times.

The Jetsons original run consisted of only 24 episodes that first aired on ABC from September 1962 to March 1963. Reruns of those same 24 episodes were broadcast on Saturday mornings on ABC (1963-64), CBS (1964–65 and 1969–71) and NBC (1965–67, 1971–76, 1979–81 and 1982–83).
