As I was putting this mess together, I was thinking that opposite-opening doors were fairly commonplace, but the desire to have more stylish and modern vehicles sort of phased them out in the late 30s and 40s. It is to be noted that the last production cars that featured Coach Doors, or by their more common name "Suicide" doors, were Lincolns and Mercurys produced from 1949 through 1951. Most would argue they were not that bad looking either.

As a young fellow, I remember asking my father why this style of rear doors were called "Suicide" doors, and he replied that from time to time, someone riding in the back seat would invariably open a rear door when the car was underway. The wind rushing alongside the car would catch the door and force it backward against the car's body. This would happen in a fraction of a second and with great force. Usually, the car door and the rear fender would suffer damage of some sort. If the unlucky passenger had a firm hold of the door handle, they much suffer the unfortunate fate of getting pulled out of

Joseph Harry Fowler Con**níck Jr**. (born September 11, 1967) ís an Amerícan sínger, píaníst, composer, actor, and television host. As of 2019, he has sold over 30 míllíon records worldwide. Connick is ranked among the top 60 best-selling male artists in the United States by the Recording Industry Association of America, with 16 million in certified sales. He has had seven top 20 US albums, and ten number-one US jazz albums, earning more number-one albums than any other artíst ín US jazz chart hístory.

Connick's best-selling album in the United States is his Christmas album When My Heart Finds Christmas (1993). His highest-charting album is his release Only You (2004), which reached No. 5 in the US and No. 6 in Britain. He has won three Grammy Awards and two Emmy Awards. He played Leo Markus, the husband of Grace Adler (played by (Continued on page 3)

I remember when the 61s first came out. I thought that they were about the best-looking luxury cars to hit the streets. They just screamed high style and luxury. I was living in Duluth at the time, and Lincolns didn't sell well up there. People with money gravitated toward Cadillacs, Buick Roadmasters, Oldsmobile 98s, and to a lesser extent, Chrysler New Yorkers. But, still, there were a few sold. One went to Jeno Palucci, the founder of Jeno's Chinese food products. He was doing well by then and could buy anything he wanted. So he went with a Continental sedan. He drove like a madman. He never observed any speed limits on the Duluth city streets and was very lucky not to have had a serious accident.

Jeno would get up around 5 a.m. every weekday and would stop at the post office to pick up all of the mail for Chung King. It would amount to several mailbags stuffed full of mail. He would take it to his office and personally open all of it up. He was not a trusting individual and was always afraid that his people would hide something from him. During this period, a

> friend of mine who worked for the Duluth PD happened to observe Jeno in a mad dash to his plant in his Continental, driving in excess of 75 in a 30 MPH zone. It was tickettime. He pulled Jeno over and asked for a driver's license and proceeded to inform him that he had been speeding in terms of wretched excess. Jeno took the ticket and promptly threw it on the ground, and speeded off to his office. It wasn't but 10 minutes later that the officer got a call to report back to the Duluth station immediately. Inside the station, my friend, the officer, gets read out by the desk sergeant for giving Mr. Palucci a speeding ticket. "We don't give Mr. Palucci speeding tickets, and we never will." "If this happens again, you will be working on a third shift beat, pounding sidewalks in downtown Duluth." That was the

way things were done in Duluth in the early 60s.

Connick began his acting career as a tail gunner in the World War II film Memphís Belle (1990). He played a serial killer in Copycat (1995) before being cast as a fighter pilot in the blockbuster Independence Day (1996). Conníck's fírst role as a leading man was in Hope Floats (1998) with Sandra Bullock. He also lent his voice to the animated cult classic The Iron Giant (1999). Hís first thriller fílm sínce Copycat was Basic (2003) with John Travolta. Additionally, he played a víolent exhusband in Bug, before two romantíc comedíes, P.S. I Love You (2007), and the leading man in New in Town (2009) with Renée Zellweger. In 2011, he appeared in the family film Dolphin Tale as Dr. Clay Haskett and in its 2014 sequel.

Early life - Harry Conníck Jr. was born and raísed in New Orleans. His mother, Anita Frances Livingston, was a lawyer and judge in New Orleans. His father, Harry Connick Sr., was the district attorney of Orleans Parish from 1973 to 2003. He has an older síster named Suzanna. Hís parents also owned a record store. Conníck's father ís a Roman Catholíc of Irísh, Englísh, Northern Irísh and German ancestry. Conníck's mother, who died of ovarian cancer, was Jewísh (her parents had emigrated from Mínsk and Víenna, respectívely). Conníck and hís síster, Suzanna, were raísed in the Lakeview neighborhood of New Orle-(Continued on page 5)

the car. Later on in my life, I would have first-hand experience of what would happen when events would come together at the same time.

My first car was a 1940 Oldsmobile four-door sedan. It was gifted to me by my maternal grandfather in the early summer of 1955. It only had about 35,000 miles on it. My grandfather lived in a small town, and in most cases, he chose to walk to where he wanted to go rather than drive there. He had decided that it was time to buy his second and last new car, a 1955 Chevrolet Bel Air; it was a truly fine car. And I wound up with a true and tested Oldsmobile sedan. And that Oldsmobile had Suicide doors.

The fall of 1955 saw me transfer to Duluth Central High School for my Junior and Senior years. Coincidently, the Perry family who lived nearby had two daughters that were planning on attending Duluth Cathedral High School, which was only a few blocks from Duluth Central. The Perry's had been friends of my parents for years, and it was a simple request to ask if the daughters could ride along with me to school each day. So each day, I would drive over to the Perry's, pick up Jean and Janet, and we would make our way to school in downtown Duluth.

All was well for a month or two until Janet blurted out that she had part of her dress caught in the car door. Before I could yell out STOP!, the door flew open and damn near pulled Janet out of the car. Jean was quick to realize what happening, and she grabbed for Janet before she actually went out of the car. The door hit the rear fender, and there were dents in both the door and the fender. Fortunately, I wasn't going that fast, so that things could have been much worse. On that day, I came to realize the true meaning of Suicide doors. Of course, those were the days before the safety interlocks that we have today would have prevented that from happening.

In addition to the article about Dick Koop's Continental, we will revisit one of the early 1960s Continentals with this Coach door feature. And now a few words from Dick Koop.

I was not going to miss another chance - I remember the announcement that Lincoln Motor Company had commissioned Cabot Coachbuilders of Massachusetts to build 80 of these rear-hinged Black Label 2019 **Coach** models to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the Lincoln Continental automobile and the iconic style of the 60's era slabside Lincoln Continentals. These 2019-2029 Coach models had the 400 HP All wheel Drive mechanicals. My first thought was, "Why didn't they just build all these Lincoln Continentals this way to make a statement and generate more foot traffic to the Lincoln showrooms? I decided I would put my name in to acquire one of

Connick started learning keyboards at age three, playing publicly at age five, and recording with a local jazz band at ten. When he was níne years old, Connick performed Beethoven's Píano Concerto No. 3 Opus 37 with the New Orleans Symphony Orchestra (now the Louisiana Phílharmonic). Later he played a duet with Eubie Blake at the Royal Orleans Esplanade Lounge in New Orleans. The song was "I'm Just Wild About Harry." This was recorded for a Japanese documentary called Jazz Around the World. The clip was also shown in a Bravo special called Worlds of Harry Conníck, Juníor. ín 1999. Hís musical talents were developed at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts and under the tutelage of Ellis Marsalis Jr. and Iames Booker.

Connick attended Jesuit High School, Isadore Newman School, Lakeview School, and the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts, which are all in New Orleans. Following an unsuccessful attempt to study jazz academically and having given recitals in the classical and jazz piano programs at Loyola University, Connick moved to the 92nd Street YMHA ín New York Cíty to study at Hunter College and the Manhattan School of Music. There he met Columbía Records executive George Butler, who persuaded hím to sígn wíth Columbía. Hís (Continued on page 6)

first record, Harry Connick Jr., was a mainly instrumental album of standards. He soon acquired a reputation in jazz because of extended stays at high-profile New York City venues. His next album, 20, featured his vocals and added to this reputation.

Career - When Harry Met Sally - Connick's reputation was growing, and director Rob Reiner asked him to provide a soundtrack for his romantic comedy When Harry Met Sally... (1989), starring Meg Ryan and Billy Crystal. The soundtrack consisted of several standards, including "It Had to Be You," "Let's Call the Whole Thing Off" and "Don't Get Around Much Anymore." The soundtrack earned double-platinum status in the United States. Conníck won hís fírst Grammy Award for Best Jazz Male Vocal Performance for his work on the soundtrack.

Connick made his screen debut in Memphis Belle (1990), based on a true story about a B-17 Flying Fortress bomber crew in World War II. In that year, he began a two -year world tour. In additíon, he released two albums in July 1990: the instrumental jazz trio album Lofty's Roach Souffle and a big-band album of mostly original songs titled We Are in Love, which also went double platinum. We Are in Love earned him his second consecutive Grammy for Best Jazz Male (Continued on page 7)

these. Well, I was just a little late, and all 80 were spoken for in just 45 minutes. I decided that my desire to own one of these would never happen.

Fast forward to 2023. These cars, now four years old, might start showing up in private sales or through one of the major auction houses. Mecum and Barrett Jackson each had one go thru their auctions earlier this year, but the price was still pretty strong. I found a dealer in Chicago that had 2 of them but were asking more than when they were first sold new. I decided to wait and begin my search by advertising for one thru our Lincoln Continental Owners Club.

Success! I was able to buy this one with just 1100 miles on it and absolutely in pristine condition. My wife and I drove it home from the Detroit area and can say the ride is remarkable. That extra 6 inches in the back seat makes a huge difference in not only the ride, but the legroom for the rear seat passengers. Beautiful finishes with lots of brightwork, leather, and creature comforts for all riders.

Now those who know me are probably asking "I thought he only collected marketing or sale failures. So how does this Lincoln Continental Coach fit in the collection? Quite simply, it doesn't, but I always thought Lincoln Motor Company really missed the opportunity to make a statement with this car, and I was not going to let one of these escape me.

Based on the quick sale of these first 80, Lincoln decided to have 125 more built for the 2020 year by the same coach builder. Everything I've read, the final production of these Coach rear door models was 230 units.

As a member of the LCOC I watched our club struggle with certifying and finding all of the Lehmann Peterson slab side limousines that Ford had commissioned to have built in the mid to late 60's. These were also all rear hinged door stretch cars with amenities similar to what the current 2019-2020 LC Coach have today. My goal is to try and get these current 2019-2020 Coach models registered and get as many of them to join our Club. The future collectability of these "new" Lincoln Continental Coach models is still to be determined. If they follow that same pattern and collectability as the Lehmann Peterson have, we need to track who owns these cars, where they are located, and preserve their history and ownership lineage.

Mid-1990s: funk - In 1994, Connick decided to branch out. He released She, an album of New Orleans funk that also went platinum. In addition, he released a song called "(I Could Only) Whisper Your Name" for the soundtrack of The Mask, starring Jim Carrey, which is his most successful single in the United States to date.

Connick took his funk music on a tour of the United Kingdom in 1994, an effort that did not please some of his fans, who were expecting a jazz crooner. Connick also went on a tour of the People's Republic of China in 1995, playing at the Shanghaí Center Theatre. The performance was televised live in China for what became known as the Shanghaí Gumbo specíal. In his third film Copycat (1995), Connick played a serial killer who terrorizes a psychiatrist (played by Sigourney Weaver). The following year, he released his second funk album, Star Turtle, which did not sell as well as previous albums, although it did reach No. 38 on the charts. However, he appeared in the most successful movie of 1996, Independence Day, with Will Smith and Jeff Goldblum.

Late 1990s: Jazz and Hope Floats - For his 1997 release To See You, Connick recorded original love songs, touring the United States and Europe with a full symphony orchestra backing him and his piano in each city. As part of his tour, he played at the Nobel Peace Prize Concert in Oslo, Norway, with his final concert of that tour in Paris

The "New" Continental... 2019 - 2020

This story, written by Matthew Keegan, first appeared in one of the on-line news sources. It is a review of a 2017 Lincoln Continental Black Label series, the finest of the fine, the best of the best. The Continental is quite probably the best Lincoln sedan ever produced. As fine as it was, it was not widely accepted by the buying public. It would also be the last sedan from Lincoln as the move went to SUV's across the board.

One of the most storied model names in Autodom is back, as in Continental by Lincoln. The all-new model and flagship sedan provides a much-needed boost for a marque that once claimed top-selling status amongst luxury brands. In more recent years, Lincoln has languished in eighth place, trailing all three German and three Japanese luxury brands and its American adversary, Cadillac.

The 2017 Lincoln Continental replaces the forgettable MKS, supplying a longer wheelbase for upholding what's nothing less than a dignified canvas. The Continental advances a new design language, also evident on the smaller MKZ and soon to appear on the 2018 Navigator. A new one-piece grille, with a signature Lincoln logo honeycomb mesh, amplifies the current expression.

The 2017 Continental offers few surprises as it maintains the silhouette of the concept Continental introduced at the 2015 New York International Auto Show. That concept was the most discussed Lincoln products showcased in at least a generation.

The one design change made since then was a significant one — the elimination of suicide doors (front-hinged first-row doors; rearhinged second-row doors). Figure that safety regulations and/or insurance considerations influenced that change.

Bringing the Continental name back was a stroke of marketing genius and timed perfectly. Continental is a name familiar to mature Americans — its reappearance comes as Lincoln celebrates its centennial this summer.

Last found on a Lincoln product in 2002, the name is synonymous with full-size luxury, although the Town Car was the brand's de facto flagship until its 2011 demise.

Through the intervening years, much of Lincoln's product line offered a series of models with a three-letter designation, with the first two M and K. That was Lincoln's way of aligning its naming convention with what other luxury brands were doing —deemphasizing individual models while drawing full attention to the make.

But Lincoln's methodology has always been confusing, especially to Lincoln loyalists who never understood the change. Resurrecting Continental suggests that the three-letter naming convention will gradually disappear.

In any case, at least Lincoln now has Continental and Navigator to lead the way down a trusted and established path, with MKC, MKT, MKX, and MKZ models following.

A stretched version of the platform underpinning the Ford Fusion and Lincoln MKZ powers the Continental. Lincoln added about six inches between the wheels to provide excellent legroom front and back. Thus, the Lincoln offers a slightly longer wheelbase than an Audi A6 but is shorter than the Audi A8L. Other comparable models include the BMW 5 Series, Genesis G80, Mercedes-Benz S-Class, Volvo S90, Lexus GS, and the Cadillac XTS.

2017 Lincoln Continental Review - The 2017 Lincoln Continental is available in four grades: Premiere (\$44,720), Select (\$47,675), Reserve (\$54,075), and Black Label (\$63,075). Add \$925 for the destination charge. Frontwheel drive is standard; all-wheel drive is available as a \$2,000 option.

My test model was a 2017 Continental Black Label all-wheel drive carrying a near-\$80,000 price tag.

Three V6 engine choices are available, beginning with a 3.7-liter naturally aspirated V6, which is standard on the Premiere and Select. A twin-turbo 2.7-liter V6 is available on the Select and is the standard engine on the Reserve and Black Label.

Further, the Reserve and Black Label offer a twin-turbo 3.0-liter V6 exclusively to Lincoln. Unlike the other two engines, no Ford product will see this 400-horsepower dynamo as it represents one of the more significant examples of brand separation between the two.

Polished, Elegant Exterior - Beyond the stately grille, the 2017 Continental offers a sleek silhouette with several notable touches. The door handles are one such feature, as they're integrated within the beltline. Simply slip a finger inside the handle and pull — the door opens with ease. And as you approach the Lincoln, the mirrors unfold, and the front and rear approach lights activate.

The wheels make a statement and are the same design showcased on the concept — at least with the Black Label model. Specifically, they're 20-inch wheels comprised of polished aluminum with a black label center cap. I won't say the wheels make the sedan, but they certainly make a statement. Other choices include 18-, 19- and 20-inch aluminum wheels painted or with chrome inserts.

Additional features of note include adaptive HID headlamps and LED daytime running lights, backlit door handles (terrific for low lighting conditions), and dual integrated bright exhaust tips.

In the Cabin - Inside, you'll find a cabin that's roomy, upscale, and covered in high-end materials. My Black Label model offered one of three color themes exclusive to the line — Chalet, Rhapsody in Blue, and Thoroughbred. Mine was a Thoroughbred — a light brown color scheme with thick leather dressing the *(Continued on page 8)*

dashboard, door inlays, and the covered storage compartment.

Further, a wood and leather-wrapped steering wheel, Alcantara headliner, and Venetian leather-trimmed seats bring this model up another notch. The rear compartment seats three but is ideal for two. Indeed, when you move into the upper echelon of the Continental range, you'll find the back seat most desirable. That is, if you opt for the Rear-Seat Package (\$4,300), what transforms the compartment into something wholly elegant.

In exchange for a hefty cash outlay option, you'll receive a center armrest console with a digital display, sun blinds, partially reclining heated and cooled seats, and four-way adjustable lumbar support. Moreover, Lincoln went one step further by adding front passenger seat control — this means you can move that seat forward for cross-your-legs comfort.

A couple of points about the interior need further examination. First, headroom is not as generous as you'd find in Lincoln models of yore. Specifically, there is not much space between the top of the heads and the headliner in the rear compartment. Tall passengers may find the space tight — measuring 6-feet, I barely avoided scraping the roof.

Second, and entirely related to the top of your head — rear compartment access and egress means carefully ducking your head. Lincoln Town Car owners will notice the difference and may come away disappointed. You may end up with a bump if you're not careful.

As for technology, the Continental pulls out all the stops. The base audio system offers 10 speakers; my test model had the 19-speaker Revel audio system — one step up from the available 13-speaker Revel system.

The current version of the SYNC telematics system is a huge improvement over the previous generation, something that should please the owners.

On the Road - If you're looking for a quiet, comfortable, and large luxury sedan, the Lincoln Continental should be on your list. That said, which Continental you choose depends largely on whether you're okay with front-wheel drive or all-wheel drive, as well as just how much power you want from your engine.

I cannot comment on the first two engines or front-wheel drive, but I will surmise that customers who place an emphasis on handling will want power sent to all four wheels as needed. And that's exactly what Lincoln's allwheel drive does when you step on the accelerator — power distribution goes to each wheel.

Even with torque mitigation technology, the front-wheel-drive models must have at least some torque steer — namely, understeer — the sensation where the front wheels shift when tapping full power.

Off-the-mark acceleration is quite good with the 3.0L V6, but the Continental executes flawlessly when needing a quick burst of passing power. The ride is somewhat firm yet comfortable, although the Lincoln doesn't manage bumps as well as some cars, with a jarring sensation felt whenever I crossed a pothole. On curvilinear roads, the big sedan remains poised, the electric steering responding immediately, even with the slightest movement. The one demerit with the 2017 Continental is pairing each engine with a six-speed automatic transmission. Although the transmission shifts smoothly up and down the band curve, more gears would help. Likely, the 10-speed automatic Ford co-developed with GM wasn't available when the new Lincoln was ready.

That said, most competitors have long offered at least seven or eight gears. The new baseline is now nine or ten gears for improved fuel economy. Incidentally, my test model makes an EPA-estimated 16 mpg in the city and 24 mpg on the highway.

Parting Thoughts - That the Continental is a wonderful departure from the MKS is a given. Lincoln needed a new model to reset the brand, and the Continental answered.

There are a few things shoppers should keep in mind when considering the Continental:

1), The price differences are dramatic. With a base price in the mid-\$40,000 range and a fully-equipped Black Label model costing more than \$82,000, there's a huge separation between models. My recommendation for shoppers is to familiarize themselves on the four grades offered, the package options, and well as the drive and engine choices.

2), All-wheel drive is best. Front-wheel drive is standard across the Continental range, but that may not satisfy your needs. All-wheel drive is a \$2,000 option, which provides improved handling for a more satisfactory driving experience. I hesitate to endorse front-wheel drive products on large sedans, especially for luxury models, and for the reasons outlined here.

To sum up, the 2017 Lincoln Continental should attract its share of traditional American luxury car buyers. It is doubtful that it'll pull many away from the German marques, Lexus or Infiniti. Acura, Volvo, and Genesis owners might take a look, as well as Cadillac owners.

1961 - 1963 Continental, a future Classic

While we are featuring a little bit about the most recent Continental, here is a brief article written by Joe DeMatio, Motor Trend Magazine and was first printed in November 2012. Lincolns of this area were universally loved when they first came out. The styling was so very much different from prior year Lincolns and also much different from its nearest luxury competitors, Cadillac and Imperial. Lincoln tried to replicate this styling to some extent with the 2017 - 2020 Continentals, but alas, for some reason dealers could not get people into the showrooms to see and drive what would be America's finest luxury sedan. Read the articles about the 1961 - 1963 Continentals and the most recent 2017 - 2020 models. I hope that you will find them interesting. Here is the article about the 60's Continental.

When critics carp that the Lincoln brand needs to "recapture its lost glory," the suicidedoor Continental is what they have in mind. Modern yet elegant, its simple, unsculpted "blade-side" sheet metal and overall symmetry instantly made its competitors, still clinging to fins and other styling excesses of the 1950s, look stale and irrelevant. The Continental was also the antithesis of its immediate predecessor, the frightful-looking 1958-60 Continentals (Marks III, IV, and V). The new Lincoln was perfectly in tune with Kennedy-era optimism and renewal; the beginnings of the sexual revolution; and the pillbox hats, slimmed-down suits, and other cultural signposts of the early 1960s now celebrated by the TV show Mad Men.

The Continental was originally penned as a two-door Thunderbird concept. Still, when future Ford president, Robert S. McNamara saw it in a design studio, he decided that it would better serve as a car to resurrect Lincoln, which was then, as now, a struggling brand. A design team supervised by Elwood Engel, who later served as Chrysler's design chief, churned out the four-door Continental in only two weeks, and it soon went into production as both a sedan and a convertible. Reviewers grasped for superlatives. Tom McCahill of Mechanix Illustrated wrote that the 1961 Continental was "one of the plushest wolftraps on the road. It's as quiet as the love life of a bass, and it rides as smooth as spilled fudge on a canted stove. [Its] looks will equal any car's in the nation and, in the opinion of some of my arty friends, will trim all others six ways from the post and twice on Sunday." Indeed. The editors of Car Life, less prone to hyperbole, declared and accurately that the Continental was "the best-looking American car built today."

The Continental was also one of the bestbuilt American cars of its time, the recipient of a rigorous quality-assurance program that began with the 1956 Mark II coupe. The Continental, like the Mark III sedan, had unibody construction but was said to be 67 percent stiffer, thanks partly to the rear-hinged back doors, which allowed for stronger B-pillars. Each of its 300-hp, 430-cubic-inch V-8 engines was dyno-tested for three hours, disassembled for visual inspection, and rebuilt, and the three-speed automatic transmission was tested for thirty minutes before installation. Completed vehicles were subjected to a twelve-mile road test, and no break-in period or 1000-mile service was required; cars were expected back in the dealership service bay when the first oil change was at 6000 miles. To reinforce the company's confidence level in the new Continental's mechanical fortitude, Lincoln added a two-year/24,000-mile warranty, virtually unheard of in the early 1960s.

The Continental became not just a highwater mark in Lincoln's styling history -equaled only by the stunning Mark III coupe of 1968 -- it put Lincoln on equal footing with Cadillac for the first time. Brian Ventura owns the velvet turquoise metallic over-turquoise convertible that we drove and also owns the matching sedan pictured here. If two turquoise 1962 Continentals seem excessive, consider that Ventura, an oboist for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, has a 525-pipe organ in the family room of his *(Continued on page 10)* (Continued from page 9) in the Broadway revival of The Pajama Game, produced by the Roundabout Theater Company, along with Michael McKean and Kelli O'Hara, at the American Airlines Theatre in 2006. It ran from February 23 to June 17, 2006, including five benefit performances running from June 13 to 17. Connick's performance was híghly acclaimed; as David Rooney wrote in Variety, "With ĥis handsome wholesomeness and those mellifluous Sinatra-esque pipes, it's hard to imagine a leading man more tailor-made for this 1954 show." The Pajama Game cast recording was nominated for a Grammy after being released as part of Connick's double disc album Harry on Broadway, Act I.

Ventura's Continental twins are sitting in his driveway, and the convertible's top is down. The cars look relatively large, but in fact, the Continental was petite in its time. Compared with the 1960 Lincoln, its wheelbase was eight inches shorter; its overall length, at 17.7 feet, was down some fifteen inches; and it was about three inches shorter in height. (By 1964, the Continental had a three-inch-longer wheelbase and a larger trunk. By 1969 -- the final year for what's considered the fourth-generation Continental -- it was a foot longer than in '61, the droptop had left the lineup, and a coupe had appeared, and the overall form had become slightly less beautiful.) Nevertheless, as you slide over the amply padded bench seat and take in the walnut trim, the twin-hooded dashboard, and the wonderfully slim steering wheel, nothing about this car reads "small." The flat hood stretches for yards in front of you, and even the horizontal brake pedal and the slanted, vertical gas pedal, both ringed in chrome, seem oversize to modern eyes.

Lower the seat electrically, fasten the lap belt, and turn the key. A muted V-8 thrum filters into the cabin, but the point of the Continental was not to hear the engine -- it was to make its driver and passengers feel pampered and fabulous. This the Lincoln does exceptionally well. As we drive along boulevards, through a park, and onto the freeway, the Continental displays the cushy ride comfort that reviewers raved about half a century ago. The automatic transmission is as smooth as one could expect, the Conti cruises at 70 to 75 mph with nonchalance, and the drum brakes -- fortified by Ventura with dual master cylinders -- are surprisingly effective. The steering has plenty of play but ultimately is precise, and the gas pedal is stiff but moves linearly.

The Continental made Lincoln relevant and cast a halo of desirability over the brand that lasted for years. The new MKZ shows great promise, but it needs to be a flagship. What we need from Lincoln is a large, rear-wheel-drive sedan with the panache, poise, and impact of the 1961 Continental. We need a Lincoln that our children will want to collect in 2061.

Why Buy? - The Continental's timeless beauty speaks of an era of boundless American optimism and of a time when Lincoln and Cadillac were building cars that were as good as anything in the world. For the cost of a new Lincoln, you can park one of these symbols of quality, good taste, and engineering excellence in your driveway. Sedan or convertible? Ask the man who owns both classical musician and Lincoln aficionado Brian Ventura: "The convertible, especially in this color, is saying, 'Take me to the beach, now!' The sedan is saying, 'Take me to the symphony!''' We say, don a skinny tie and drive either one.

He arranged all of the songs, played every instrument, and sana every part. In addition to the famíliar, traditional songs, Conníck wrote and recorded new tracks that tell the story of his experience coping during lockdown and feeling the full spectrum of emotions that came with it. Both the album cover and the music vídeos for "Amazing Grace" and "Alone With My Faith" were conceived and directed by Harry's daughter Georgía Connick. Alone With My Faith earned Connick his 16th career GRAMMY nomínation for Best Roots Gospel Album as part of the 64th annual GRAMMY awards.

Connick and New Orleans, Hurricane Katrina -Connick, a New Orleans native, is a founder of the Krewe of Orpheus which is a music-based New Orleans krewe. It takes its name from Orpheus of classical mythology. The Krewe of Orpheus parades on St. Charles Avenue and Canal Street in New Orleans on Lundi Gras (Fat Monday) the day before Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday).

On September 2, 2005, Connick helped organize and appeared in the NBCsponsored live telethon concert, A Concert for Hurricane Relief, for relief in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. He spent several days touring the city to draw attention to the plight of citizens stranded at the (Continued on page 14)
