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Anthony Russo February 27, 1953 -- November 23, 2023

Anthony R. "Tony" Russo, 70, a long-time resident of Skippack, PA, passed away after an illness on Thursday morning, November 23, 2023, at Bryn Mawr Hospital. He and his wife, Fran Fusco Russo celebrated their 21st wedding anniversary on June 8th of this year.

Born February 27, 1953, in Philadelphia, PA, he was a son of the late Anthony G. and Jeanne (Lembo) Russo. He was a 1971 graduate of Bishop Kenrick High School and earned his bachelor's degree from Cabrini College in 1975. He was the owner of Collegeville Financial Insurance Group for many years.

An avid horseman, Anthony was a co-founder of Ivy Hill Therapeutic Equestrian Center. He spent many years of his youth trail riding and competing in Western-style horse shows, where he won several ribbons for his riding skills. He was a member of Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary Catholic Church as well as the Commercial Club at Port Indian. He enjoyed time on the water, boating and wakeboarding and belonged to the Norristown Boat Club. Anthony enjoyed cutting and packaging his own meats, a skill he learned from his father. His greatest satisfaction, however, came from working on and collecting antique automobiles. He belonged to several antique car clubs, including the Lincoln Continental Owners Club, where he served as the National Chief Judge. Anthony won countless prizes, trophies, and accolades for his cars over the years.

Those who knew him often observed that Anthony always had a smile on his face. He was the type of person who would light up a room when he entered it, and he made countless friends wherever he went. Anthony loved singing Frank Sinatra songs, and shared his talents whenever he had the chance, to the delight of everyone who heard him. He was funny and generous and will be terribly missed.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by his sister, Rosemary Gehrlein and her husband, Steven, of Betzwood, PA; and his beloved nephew, David Bradley and his wife, Meredith Dean, of Princeton Junction, NJ. He was preceded in death by his brother, Joseph N. Russo, in 1972.

was wonderful and we all enjoyed our lunch tremendously. After we left there we had time to do some relaxing, car cleaning and mechanical judging before the evening festivities began.
