John Curry:

John's auto mechanical past has been an interesting one. Curry got his start at the Ford Motor Company Technician Training Program under Hill and Saunders Ford in Weaton, MD. Later, he attended Embry Riddle Aeronautical University and majored in Aeronautical Science. Curry attended University of District of Columbia, Aerospace Mechanics program, A&P, later he went to work for Northeast Ford in Washington, DC and



for Metro Transit. Curry attended the Detroit Diesel Allison personal training program to enhance the knowledge and electronics. During his time in the diesel industry, he remained in contact with Ford Motor techs as Metro Transit had a fleet of Ford and GM cars and trucks. Curry retired from Metro [WMATA] after 32 years of service and then worked with a regional mail contract companies as both a driver and a mechanic. Curry also worked as a Cash Control Manager and Parking Control Systems Tech for PMI parking in DC and Old Town Trolley Tours in DC as a Mechanic on Freightliner Chassis with sightseeing touring bodies and Ford conversion touring vans. Curry then worked on city buses and the new EV Proterra Electric busses. His last and present stop is with the Alexandria Transit, known as the Dash Bus, where in



2019, Curry was hired to reactivate a fleet of retired Liberty Lines 60-foot articulated busses from New York, and retired MCI coach busses for a serious transit emergency, due to a major rail system shut down for repairs on the Yellow and Blue Line train stations in Virginia . This joint program with Academy Coach and Metro Transit was a success. During this time his next project was on the new EV electric bus program which handled Proterra and New Flyer buses. The Electric bus program was nationwide to improve clean air; many transit companies are participating.

He has been working on autos most of his life starting at age 14, Ford motor company products, Chrysler ,Mopar, and Pontiacs and Cadillacs are his favorites.



Curry's personal fleet as of the moment consist of his 1969 Mark III, a 2015 Mustang and a 2020 Lincoln Aviator.

In the past he has owned: a 1971 Swinger, 1976 cobra, 1982 Mustang GT, 1983 Turbo Coupe, 1979 XJ-8 [L-82 chevy conversion], 1979 Mercedes Benz 300D, 1987 Continental Mark 7, 1986 Jaguar xj-6, 1988 Acura Legend, 1995 Thunderbird, 1996 Nissan Altima, 1993 Isuzu -Rodeo, 1998 Ford Explorer sport, 2003 Mercury Mountaineer, 2003 Mercury Marauder, 1971 Mark III, 2016 Ford XLT Explorer, 2018 Explorer Sport, 2020 Edge ST [Dyno tuned] and a 2020 Lincoln Aviator.

My fascination with cars started as a child. My story began with a Match Box & Hot Wheels collection and continued with participating in model car competitions, bumper cars, and Go Kart racing. I attended the DC Amory World of Wheels show in the early 60's with my father, where I entered the model car competition. I built The Little Red Wagon with cotton glued around the wheels and thread for the spark plugs. I had no directions and no parts left over. The judges were impressed, and I won 2nd place in my division. I was hooked for life... That was the beginning of having dreams of one day having a winner show car.

My passion for cars continued in my teenage years. As a rite of passage, you had to get a car, fix it up, to get the girls. I started out as a Mopar man, for the performance. My mother gifted me her 1963 Dodge Dart Convertible and my first car was a 1969 Charger R/T. In total, I have owned 8 Mopar vehicles. As an adult, I was Assistant Director for Goodwill Industries Car Department that accepted donations and conducted auctions. Most donated cars, if not all were in pretty bad condition.

This is the how I became the owner of my 1970 Mark III, "STINKN LINKN". It came in with the original owner who stated his kids didn't want it and he couldn't drive it anymore. The owner said it was luxurious. I was impressed with its appearance. The body lines were amazingly straight. There was nothing wrong with it, except for rear quarter panel damage that the owner caused putting it in his garage where it sat for a year. I was a little reluctant, because at the time, my father and I were Cadillac men. Nevertheless, I offered him \$300, and the rest is history.



In 2008, I became the owner of this car and started my journey. I had no idea what I had gotten myself into. I received my first local car show award for Best Work in Progress and was gifted my first LCOC magazine at that show. I was working on the body and primer as a color. Thereafter, I started the Continental Cruisers in 2010 with two members and now we are an impressive 50 strong. We are recipients of numerous awards and have been featured in every medium: radio, television, videos, movies, and magazines. Joining the LCOC organization was definitely the highlight ownership of 6 Lincoln's. Currently I have 3, including my daily driver 2016 MKT. My wife has a rare 89 MARK VII Convertible.

This journey has been a wonderful ride. The friends I've met, the cars I've seen, the places I've been made the







dreams of a kid at the World of Wheels with a model car come true. The fellowship and camaraderie of Lincoln enthusiasts and owners and the preservation of these beautiful, historic pieces of art makes it all worth the money time and effort of owning the Classic Lincolns. I am looking forward to what the future brings.

Where do we put the Watermelons?

My first car was a 1940 Ford Sedan, which I bought in 1950 at the age of sixteen. Ford called this a "FORDOOR."

This particular car had been a green and white taxi during the Second World War. It had pounds of liquid metal which preceded plastic on the fenders and doors, wall papered interior and the 2 x 4 framed doors. My best friend Don's father had installed a rebuilt engine and rebuilt the transmission as well. Don and I repainted the car light Ford Green. This automobile was in fact purchased for only \$150.00, if you can believe that!

One hot summer Sunday in 1952, three friends and I decided to visit my Uncle Will.

He had a summer house in Leonardo, which was at the Jersey Shore; we also obviously liked to cool off in the water. As it turns out when we arrived at my Uncle Wills, my parents and other family members had also come to visit; great minds think alike after all!

My uncle's home had been built way back in the 1880's. It

was small with a water pump in the kitchen and a double-seated outhouse some 100 feet behind the house. I mention the outhouse since it was notorious in our family for a very unusual reason. The reason being wasps had made a nest inside of it and mind you, this is way before spray bombs or Raid was around to kill said bugs & bees. The owner of the town's hardware store told my Uncle Bill to just pour some gasoline down the hole and after a while the fumes should chase away the wasps.

Realizing that this was a double holler, Uncle Will bought about 10 gallons and then proceeded to pour it all down. He then advised the family to stay clear of the house for several hours and to go on down to the beach. Later that day, Uncle Don arrived after commuting all the way down from North Jersey. After arriving at the house, he changed into his swimsuit and met the family down at the beach. Unfortunately, Uncle

Don never got word about the wasps or the gasoline; to make matters even worse, he smoked cigarettes. After spending the day at the beach, everyone went back to the house and promptly started getting dinner ready. In the commotion of getting back and starting dinner, Uncle Don wandered out the outhouse. There was a muffled "WOMPF" followed by a loud yell as the outhouse door flew open. Uncle Don had been blown out with his pants around his ankles with a resounding thud as he landed face down in the grass. This spectacle continues to live on in the minds of the family to this day. Fortunately, Uncle Don was not hurt and after a few minutes, we all started to laugh uncontrollably. After a busy day at the beach, we left for home after dinner at around 7pm. Even way back in the 40's and 50's traffic on Routes 9, 34 and 35 were still just as

> terrible; these were all twolane roads with no traffic lights or draw bridges. It was about 55 miles from Uncle Will's back home, which was about three good hours. As we proceeded home it was hot and humid, so to cool off after about 15 miles we stopped at a roadside stand for sodas. After returning to the car, my friend Larry asked us to help him carry the four watermelons he

purchased as well as the half basket of peaches I bought. Everything we bought fit nicely into the trunk and away we went stopping and starting about every 25 feet for well over an hour.

As we were driving home, we passed by a pirate ship that seemed out of place. Turns out, it was the office building of a housing developer; with the housing subdivision being built behind said pirate ship. We were driving by when the old Ford started to act very strangely; I for the life of me couldn't get out of 2nd gear which ended in my shutting the motor off. Fortunately, we happened to encounter this issue near a service station a few yards up the road; using the starter, I was able to get us to that station. Back in those days, service stations not only sold gas and cleaned your windows with a smile but many of them also repaired cars. When the attendant looked at the vehicle, he told





us that the throw-out bearing had gone and it couldn't be repaired until the following morning. What to do! What to do!



Simple said Larry, "We will give whoever gives us a ride a watermelon!" As we started to walk down the line of cars, we noticed that each car was filled with people and in many cases filled with peaches or watermelon. We started to get tired after more than 30 minutes, not to mention there were no rides in sight. Naturally, we all had to work the next day, so we started to get desperate while the melons & peaches grew so heavy as we carried them. Suddenly a familiar sight appeared, could it be a light at the end of the tunnel? Down the line of cars there it was, a bug eyed 37 Willys that somehow happened to be my mother, father, sister & her friend and aunt and uncle. Yes, you read that right...six people stuffed into that little Willys and here were four full-sized boys desperate for a ride. Luckily for us, the traffic was so very slow that were able to walk alongside the Willys deciding this was how it could be done. Dad and Mom had lived through the depression, so the melons and peaches would be saved but what to do with the boys? The peaches were poured out of the bag onto the rear shelf behind the rear seat, the melons went on the floor two in the back and two in the front on the passenger side. We put all our wet clothes into the tiny trunk with everyone else's. Larry got into the back seat and since my uncle was short, he sat on Larry's lap. In addition to them, my sister's friend was on my aunt's lap. Bob was very slim,

so he was also squeezed into the rear. Now we still had two people left, so of course my dad was driving and the only one in the driver's seat. Keep in mind though that all this shuffling of peaches, melons & people were being done while moving along 1 to 3 miles per hour. You see, dad absolutely refused to give up his place in the line of traffic because he too had worked the next day. My mother and sister were already in front, so we were out of the room so as we walked along, it didn't look good for Bill and me. Although, if traffic continued to go as slow as it was, we could potentially keep walking home. But of course, up ahead it looked as though traffic was starting to move faster. What to do! What to do! The Willys happened to have running boards, but they were not very wide. Bill and I figured if we stood on them while holding onto the inside of the car, we'd be able to get home. Not the safest way to travel but with the load we had on the Willys, however we never went over 20 to 25 miles per hour. I criticized that little Willys a lot, but somehow it always managed to come through. Just think about it, a small car not much bigger than a Volkswagen with four doors; A four-cylinder engine that produced maybe 40 horses bringing home ten people, a trunk full of wet clothes, four watermelons and a ½ basket of peaches. When traveling alone, Dad rarely did more than 45 miles per hour but on this summer night, we averaged maybe 15

night.
One last thought...can you imagine what would happen to Dad today if he tried this? Ten people, eight inside & two across the front fenders, no seat belts, watermelons, and peaches rolling around inside, and traveling 10 to 15 mph on major roads...I guess the best he could hope for would be a life sentence of driving a manure wagon with the wind always at his back.


