
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'Round and About...

Did you know.....



Sold at the Scottsdale Barrett Jackson Auction this past January for \$33,000.00, this 1973 Lincoln Mark IV "Bugazzi" is 1 of 12 designed and built by George Barris' Hollywood Coach Builders in the 1970s. It was built on a Lincoln Continental Mark IV platform and featured unusual custom touches throughout. This Lincoln is powered by a 460ci V8 engine mated to an automatic transmission.

What did Frank Sinatra, Ole Blue Eyes, and fellow Rat Packers Sammy Davis Jr., Dean Martin, Peter Lawford and Joey Bishop all have in common? They all owned one of these wild luxury custom Bugazzi. Joe Conforte, the infamous proprietor of the Mustang Ranch and other Nevada houses of ill repute, was the original owner of this Bugazzi.

This custom Lincoln was restored and modified in the 2000s by the former owner, with Barris' blessing. It was completed in 2009 and is titled as a 1973 LCONT.

Pea Salad Submitted by Laura Cielenski

Ingredients

- 8 slices cooked bacon, crumbled
- 4 cups frozen peas
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup shredded cheddar cheese
- ½ cup diced red onion

Dressing

- ½ cup mayonnaise
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream
- 1 tbsp. sugar
- 2 tsp. vinegar
- Salt & Pepper to taste

Instructions

- Combine all dressing ingredients in a large bowl. Whisk till combined.
- 2. Add peas, onion, bacon and cheese to bowl. Gently stir. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- 3. Refrigerate for at least 2 hours before serving.

WAUKEGAN ADVENTURE

Roll up for the History Tour.....

it's waiting to take you away, and away we went and a tour it was, and then some. LSR members Harry Came and Greg Brown were our hosts for the day as we toured Waukegan and its area history, including Harry's home, the recently refurbished Carnegie Library and the Haines Museum House. Twenty-one guests attended this extremely well-orchestrated, well-executed event.



We began with a delightful light breakfast consisting of coffee and Danishes at Harry's circa 1842 home complete with a cupola. Walking up to the ornate wooden screen door complete with the doorbell knob you pull, instead of push, you know you're in for a walk back in time. Once inside you are not disappointed, as the first thing you see is the somewhat steep circular staircase leading to the upper floor. The home is tastefully furnished with period-correct furnishings including a porcelain stove, along with other antiques. Growing up in a home with parents that were avid antique collectors and a "don't touch" décor, I can relate.





Tom O'Donnell's 1940 Mercury parked in the driveway really set the tone for the day.

The tour started with Harry leading the group in his slab-sided '63 Continental Convertible and included other members who drove their Lincolns. Also in attendance was Harry's neighbor and a car show friend of mine, who drove her '73 Buick Electra 225.








Our first stop was the 125-year-old recently reopened Carnegie Library now the home of the Waukegan Historical Society which sat vacant for an incredible 60 years.


Once a plan for adaptive use was formulated and funding between private donations, the Waukegan Historical Society and Federal funds, the 1903 building was restored at a cost of 15 million dollars. The transformation is incredible, and we took a picture to mark the momentous occasion.





Through-out the library there were images of "before and after" of the same space. Ty Rohrer, the Cultural Arts Manager for the Waukegan Park District, was our Docent. Our first stop was the Ray Bradbury room, where all volumes in the room were from

Mr. Bradbury's private collection. The author also read in this very room as a child. The tranformation of the fireplace mantle and the room in general is astounding. Pay special attention to the "after" image and then see us all there, from a different angle. Eerie or redundant depending on your viewpoint.

Did you know that Jack Benny grew up in Waukegan? In fact, he lived only three blocks south of the library on the same street Harry resides on.






President Lincoln visited in 1860. His speech on anti-slavery was interrupted by a warehouse fire.

perfect evening and made for a pleasant return to the hotel. Tim Wilson of the Southern Ohio Region addresses the group in the picture below and right.


Saturday is always show day! I awoke to a bright clear sky, and while it was really hot, it was dry and would be that way for the next few days.

Tech Tip

Tech Tip 1 – Trunk Lamp

While having my 1948 Continental mechanically judged at the Cincinnati National Meet, I was asked if my trunk light worked. I replied, "I don't have a light in the trunk".

I was then informed that every Continental from 1940 thru 1948 had a trunk lamp that operates only when the taillights are turned on.

I was determined to see what happened to mine; It should be there......and maybe it still was. The following morning I pulled back the trunk lining and found it buried against the car's body.

Caked under paint and undercoating, it was hard to see, and the actual switch was missing, but the bezel was there. I checked for current at the lead that was to power the light and it was dead. Removing the back panel revealed why. The wire that runs from the taillight to the trunk lamp was missing. My guess is that during the car's restoration, the switch was covered and forgotten. I ran an alligator clipped wire from the rear wiring harness to the trunk light and it lit up!!



I have a switch on order and then I will have a well-lit trunk! It is very satisfying to be able to repair little things like this on your Lincoln (or any vintage vehicle you may own).

Tech Tip # 2 – Stretch Wrap

One of the most frustrating issues I've had with my 1948 Lincoln Cabriolet is the ability to keep the car dry when traveling. I don't own, or do I want to own, an enclosed trailer. There are several reasons for this, the first is I don't have a place to store it at my home. And second, towing a Lincoln is a big job already for my Lincoln Pickup, let alone a huge box trailer with a 4,000 lb. car inside.

My truck and trailer set up has performed perfectly for decades except when it rains. The top on my nearly 80-year-old Continental leaks everywhere! After trailing the car in rain, I find water has soaked the seats, carpets and dashboard, I'm also concerned about the long-term damage this moisture will cause like mold and deformation of door panels. This fear necessitates me to then vacuum up what I can and then use multiple fans for days in order to dry out the interior.

I have tried many other suggested options and all have failed. I do have a waterproof car cover but that is only for when the car is stationary, the car cannot be driven down the road or a flapping cover will rub off the Lincoln's paint in no time. I

have attempted to cover the car's top portion with a heavy weight plastic material called crash tape. This stuff is sold in a big roll

and is designed to keep water out of a crashed car therefore protects a car's electronics, and works pretty well, However when it came time to remove it from the car, it also took some of the car's finish too! I think I have found a solution; a fascinating 15" wide clear film that sticks only to itself. It is extremely

thin, light and very flexible material that is 100% waterproof and cannot possibly scratch or remove paint. It is easily available through Amazon or Walmart, it is inexpensive, easy to apply, and easy to remove.

I liken it to a heavy-duty Saran Wrap and when finished, just peal it off the car, roll it up into a ball and throw it away. It cannot be used a second time.




The product is TICONN Stretch Wrap Stretch Film Roll, 1000ft Industrial Strength 15-inch-Wide Clear Plastic Wrap with Handles for Pallet Wrapping Shipping and Moving.

I have towed my car on a trailer in the rain and the stretch wrap stays firmly attached to the car and shows no paint damage whatsoever. At only about \$20 for a 1,000 ft. roll, it will last a very, very long time. Good luck with using this material on your leaking Lincoln and contact me if you have any questions.

Tech Tip #3 – Windshield Wiper Motor

This past Easter Sunday, I took delivery of a 1959 Thunderbird Convertible. Having found the car on Bring a Trailer, a popular online auction site. It's a very nice car, but as is always the case when buying an old car, it needed several issues that had to be addressed, one of them being the windshield wipers. The wipers would operate and park at the base of the windshield properly, but only when the engine was running. Once shut off, the wipers would creep up and stop about halfway up the windshield. I had to figure out the problem, but first I had to determine HOW this weird operation was engineered to work. This tech tip is relevant to Lincolns because the 1958-1960 Thunderbirds and the 1958-1960 Lincolns share the same wiper system.




In my opinion, the factory wiper setup is really archaic being that it operates via vacuum motor and a circular drum that holds four cables that move the wiper blades back and forth. I decided to go online to see what others had to say and almost immediately I was told to forget that old cable/vacuum motor setup and "upgrade" to a \$400 electric motor. Nope, not me. Ford installed many thousands of these wipers back in the day and I'm going to get it back

working as originally engineered.

I started in the shop manual which was fairly helpful because there was a diagram showing the motor and cables, but didn't really tell me how to remove the vacuum motor and the related cables so I could fix what was wrong.

Because I wanted to remove the cables, motor and drum that held the cables, I felt it would be best to color code the four cable ends and their retainers on the drum by painting them in four different colors for later reattachment.

Once that was done, I relieved the tension on all the cables by loosening the nut at the end of the drum and then using a set of vice grips, compress springs that held the cables tight in their assigned groves. Since there was no further strain on the cables, they fell free and then I could take out the drum, the motor and the bracket that held the drum.

Tech Tip #3 – Windshield Wiper Motor (cont...)



I then sent the motor out to be rebuilt at which point I discovered why the wipers were not operating as they should. It turned out the bracket that is the go-between the vacuum and the drum was installed upside down so the spring that is supposed to keep the wipers down against the bottom of the windshield was now pushing the wipers up off the windshield!

Replacing the cables back on the drum in their proper positions

was actually not bad at all, just make sure you color code them and take plenty of pictures.

Now, I have wipers that stand ready to work at the first sign of rain......and there was no need to switch to an Electrical system!
