CHICKEN CRESCENT ALMONDINE Submitted by Dick Nelson

Ingredients

- 3 cups cooked chicken
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 4oz. can sliced water chestnuts
- 1 4oz. can mushrooms, drained
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped celery
- 2/3 cup mayonnaise
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream
- $\frac{1}{2}$ onion, minced or 1 tsp. onion powder
- 8 oz. can crescent rolls
- 2/3 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup slivered almonds
- 3 T. melted margarin or butter
- 1. In a pan or microwave heat first 8 ingredients until hot.
- 2. Pour into greased 9x13 baking dish.
- 3. Separate crescent rolls and place over chicken mixture.
- 4. Combine last 3 ingredients and spread over the rolls.
- 5. Bake at 375 for 25 minutes or until crust is golden brown.
- 6. Serve Immediately!

Some excellent examples that I <u>did</u> manage to take images of were a couple of very clean Packard's; a '55 Packard Four Hundred Coupe complete with period suitcases (we had a set growing up) and a beautiful '36 Series 120 Sport Coupe. The 120 Series is what saved Packard during the Depression years as it was a lower priced vehicle to address the entry level buyer.

My Ford/Lincoln Journey (so far)

I grew up in what was mostly a Ford vehicle family. We had some outliers here and there such as a grandfather who liked Pontiacs and a great grandfather who preferred Cadillacs, but for the most part, I was surrounded by Fords and Lincolns.

My earliest automotive memories include the day we visited my great uncle Frank Moyle in Chicago. I was probably about 5, which would place this in '73, and he owned a Lotus Ford Indy car. He had it on a trailer in his workshop, which by itself was mesmerizing to my young eyes. He picked me up and sat me in the driver's seat of that racer and for some reason a switch flipped in my brain, and I have been a car guy ever since.

Great uncle Frank was mostly a Ford/Lincoln guy. His daily driver was always a Continental no more than a couple years old and later when he decided to start doing a lot of traveling, he chose a Ford Econoline conversion van with all the plush accommodations indicative of that type of vehicle at the time. He also had Porsches, but we won't hold that against him.

His mother, my great grandmother, always drove Continentals as well and I have so many fond memories of her yellow '77 Town Car. As a 9-year-old, I was struck by the plush luxurious silent interior with all its bells and whistles and how you couldn't feel anything when going over railroad tracks.

My dad, who was a mechanical engineer for John Deere in Moline, IL from the time he graduated from grad school in '64 until the day he passed away in '92 was a devoted Ford man. After he graduated and got that job, he rewarded himself with the purchase of a shiny new '64 ½ Mustang. I came along in '68 and I remember riding in a car seat in the back of that car. It was our family car until he sold it to our paperboy in '77 who promptly wrecked it. Dad replaced it with a custom ordered '77 Thunderbird which became our new family car and the following year he picked up a '78 Ford Fiesta to commute to work to try to cut back on the gas we were burning. It was getting up to 70 cents a gallon after all! It was the 70s so the Thunderbird was chocolate brown with brown vinyl interior, and the Fiesta was bright orange. An interesting story about the Thunderbird is while it was being transported from the factory, the upper deck of the train car it was riding on collapsed and crushed it, so the factory had to build another one.

In '78, my dad's co-worker and best friend, Bart Swales, stopped by our house with his amazing new Continental Mark V. I remember it was absolutely jaw dropping gorgeous. It must have been a designer series, and I remember seeing the padded vinyl on the spare tire hump of the trunk lid and thinking to myself "This car is so fancy, it even has upholstery on the OUTSIDE!" Seeing these two educated and intelligent men who I respected very highly go gaga over that car made a very lasting impression on me. During a recent visit to my hometown cemetery to visit my parents, I noticed Mr. Swales' grave not far away. I stopped for a moment to thank him for making such a positive impact on my automotive life.

In the late 80s, Dad purchased a new Ford Tempo as the family car and the '77 Thunderbird became my first car. I was so proud and happy every time I was behind the wheel. My friends all called it the thunderchicken, but I didn't care. They still wanted to climb in and cruise in comfort and style. It was certainly a very large car to learn to drive in, but my dad wanted as much steel around me as possible and it fit the bill perfectly. In those early years of driving, I had several mishaps and misjudgments, but to its credit, that Thunderbird only had one dent in it when it and I finally parted ways. The same cannot be said for the things and vehicles I hit with it. They sure don't make 'em like that anymore.

Dads' final car that he purchased prior to his passing was a '92 Ford Escort to replace the Fiesta. It came to me and while it was a fine car, it didn't fit the image I wanted for myself at the time, so I traded it for a red '91 Mercury Capri convertible. I got way too many speeding tickets in that car and had to get cars that were not such a magnet for law enforcement for a while until my youthful enthusiasm died down.

In the years since, there have been a wide range of makes and models that have come and gone as daily drivers. I won't bore you with the entire list, but the relevant ones for this discussion are '97 and '99 F-150 pickups, '98 Mustang GTs (coupe and convertible) and a '05 Econoline 350 club wagon.

One notable exception to this was in '17. Things were going well, and I wanted to reward myself with something nice. The previous year I had attended the Detroit auto show and while visiting the Lincoln display, I was struck by a few things. The first was the soon to be released Continental, which was going to be out of my price range. The second was the facelift of the MKZ that was going to include that beautiful new grill from that Continental and the third was a very impressive display of the upscale Black Label program, which reminded me a lot of the designer series of my youth. In the summer of '16 I went to the EAA Airventure event in Oshkosh, WI and Ford/Lincoln had a display there among the aircraft. One of the vehicles on display was the facelifted MKZ in Black Label trim in the Vineyard theme. I had the same jaw-dropping moment that I had with that Mark V when I was a kid. The colors and

elegance of that vehicle were just so different than anything else on the road. And I loved that it was available as a hybrid and achieved up to 45 MPG! In the summer of

'17 I walked into my nearest Lincoln Black Label dealer, which was in Milwaukee and ordered a '17 MKZ Hybrid Black Label with the Vineyard theme. The salesperson felt they should be able to turn it around in a few weeks, but what she didn't take into account was that the factory was shut down to tool up for the '18 model year, so I ended up having to wait five months for that car to arrive. When it did, it was an '18 model, which was identical to the '17, so it was still what I had ordered. What a proud and amazing



moment and I was driving a Lincoln to many club events! Sadly, after 130,000 miles of faithful service, the hybrid transaxle self-destructed (I suspect with a little help from a bad technician during a major service) and the replacement unit never really operated properly, so I traded it in '23.



The more interesting vehicles are the collector cars that I have had in my workshop (toys). The first was a '87 Porsche Carrara Cabriolet (Thanks great Uncle Frank). I learned a lot about restoring a vehicle from that car, but it didn't feed my need for luxury and style. The next one was a '37 Buick Century. I did a complete body off frame restoration of that car and it just about drove me crazy. I won't be doing that again, but glad I had the experience, and I learned that pre-war cars and post-war cars

are very different animals.

In '15 I decided to get something I really wanted and selected a '54 Lincoln Capri coupe with a continental kit. What a beautiful and classy car. I found it in Crystal Lake, IL and it had been in storage for decades. It was cosmetically perfect but had lots of mechanical issues as cars that sit for really



long periods of time often do. The fact that no one in the club knew about the car's existence was surprising to me given its location. The purchase of this vehicle is what brought me to the club, and I am so grateful that it did. What a wonderful and supportive group of friends! Sadly, in '16 I ran into some financial difficulties and had to part with the Capri. Toys are always the first thing to go in times of challenge. I was only able to drive it to one club event, which was the visit to the Rock Island arsenal, but at



least it was able to make an appearance before it was sold into a private collection on the east coast where I worry it may never be seen again. I miss that car a lot.

One good thing that happened about this same time is I met Angi and she quickly was bitten by the collector car bug too and immediately became involved in the club with me. We are celebrating 9 years together now and our time with the club is one of the things we love doing together very much.



We went several years without a toy, but in '22 we felt we were able to finally add one to our stable and we purchased a 58' Thunderbird. I had gone down to Florida to look at a '57 Premier and had asked Chris Dunn of Lincoln Land in Clearwater to accompany me to check it out. The Premier had some issues and neither he nor I were fired up about it after inspecting it. During the trip he mentioned he had a '58 Thunderbird in his

garage at home that he had recently acquired from the original owner in Nebraska and asked if I wanted to see it. I jumped at the chance. Chris's garage is a great collection as you might imagine given his business. He had acquired the Thunderbird and a '56 Mark II from the same family and both were absolutely pristine time capsules. It had been completely babied and only



had about 35K original miles on the odometer. The Mark was way out of my price range, but I called Angi right away after test driving the T-bird and told her that I thought I had found our next car. We purchased the car and went about addressing the few minor issues it had from sitting. We were able to take it to the club event at the Harley-Davidson Museum in Milwaukee. Once again, I ran into some unpleasant financial surprises later that year and sold the car to a dentist in Memphis, but I really kick myself for letting it go.

Another period of toylessness until the spring of this year when Angi and I decided we had gone long enough without a Lincoln. We started a search, setting a specific budget limit, which also limited which models we could include in our search. As we scanned the listings on Hemmings, my eye kept being drawn to those Mark Vs that made such an impression on me as a kid. Eventually we went to a broker in Michigan who was



selling a few cars we liked on consignment. On the way there she noticed that a 78' Mark V had just been added to the inventory that we had not seen before. It was stunning in black with the unusual white carriage roof and black leather interior. We hurried to the broker and took it for a drive. Long story short (too late) it became ours! I intend to do a separate write up about the car and its history, both before and during our ownership, so stay tuned for that.

Next year, As Angi and I look to the end of the lives of our current daily drivers, we once again turn our eyes toward Lincoln. While I don't love SUVs and crossovers, we both find ourselves attracted to the new Nautilus and Aviator, so who knows, perhaps another Black Label? I keep holding out hope that Lincoln will build a sedan again. Either way, the journey continues.

Tech Tip

Tech Tip 1 -

It's not often that I can recommend one of the tons of cleaning products for wheels that are found on the shelves of any auto parts stores. Those that know me, know that I'm pretty picky about the cleanliness of my vehicles, and while I'm always seeking out new ways to do things, I'm normally not impressed with the results.

But there is one exception, and that is one I found really does a beautiful job on aluminum wheels. It's called Hot Rims Aluminum Wheel Cleaner, made by Meguire's. I love this stuff, and here's why.

While it just looks like a simple liquid spray, it is actually a foam that really clings to the wheel surface, thereby giving me a chance to really get into the cavities and ridges of the rim. Within seconds, the road grime and brake dust are gone and a very bright shine remains on the wheel. I am VERY impressed and for about \$6-7 a bottle, you really can't go wrong. I have not tried this product on chrome or stainless-steel hubcaps, but I don't see why it would not work on those as well. Here is how it foams up on the Lincoln Mark LT pickup truck aluminum rims. And below are my final results.

Tech Tip #2 –

This Tech Tip, is really geared more to a trailer than a Lincoln. I hope you find it of interest as the tip was born out of real-world experience when a well-intended person wanted to speed up the task at hand of getting my 1948 Lincoln onto my trailer at the conclusion of a car show for the trip back home.

I normally just drive the car up the trailer ramps myself, but what the heck, everyone can use a hand from time to time, so I let him be my guide.

Following my helper's clear "directions", I was left with my poor Continental resting on the trailer ramps at such an extreme angle, it took me over half an hour to get the car off the trailer and back on the ground! I decided to make sure that all this hassle would be avoided in the future by painting a 10" wide white stripe centered on the trailer runners, which sharply contrasts with the black trailer. This way it would be MUCH easier for a helper, or myself, by simply keeping all the tires within the painted white stripes! I've only used this system a few times, but so far, it works like a charm!!
